However, only a small number of Scottish families settled in Canada, prior to the influx of settlers, predominantly Catholics from the Highlands, in the late 18th century. The largest groups of Scottish Catholics settled in the Glengarry district of eastern Ontario, Prince Edward Island and eastern Nova Scotia.
